"Women, Education, Politics, and Why All Three are Relevant to Community Colleges."

Let that sink in: Nancy Chen is part of the U.S. Congressional Record.

When Chen moved to the U.S. from Taiwan to pursue studies at Minnesota State University, Moorhead her political life had not been mapped out for her, but the trajectory had been set. After she earned her Bachelor's in Education, Nancy taught elementary school for five years; at the end of 1970, she and her husband left MN and moved to Naperville, IL where Chen discovered the local community college. Over the years, Chen took a variety of classes, learned more about her DuPage County community, and came to settle comfortably in her new home. She also began to discover her life's work, and the value of community colleges to both native community members and to recent immigrants.

Nancy's public service career included serving as Director of U.S. Senator Paul Simon's Chicago Office and Director of Asian-Pacific American Outreach at President Clinton's White House Office of Presidential Personnel. She retired from her 13-year post as Midwest Regional Administrator of the Women's Bureau in U.S. Department of Labor in 2010.

A current member of the Board of Counselors of the Paul Simon Public Policy Institute, a past appointee by the U. S. Secretary of Defense to serve as a member of the Defense Advisory Committee on Women in the Services, Chen also founded and led the National Women's Political Caucus of Greater Chicago and has served as a member of the Illinois Advisory Committee to the US Commission on Civil Rights.

Her long career in public service and public policy focused on the realities, impact, and economics of women in the workforce: On the occasion of Chen's retirement, IL Congressional Representative, the Hon. Janice D. Schakowsky, wanted Chen recognized in the official U.S. Congressional Record, noting that Chen was "a fighter for working women."

"Nancy directed and developed the regional program through collaboration and partnership with women's organizations, employers, unions, and other government agencies in the states of Illinois, Indiana, Minnesota, Michigan, Ohio and Wisconsin. Under her leadership, the regional office effectively promoted non-traditional occupations for women, including green jobs and careers in science, technology and engineering, and she helped achieve concrete advances in workplace flexibility and pay equity."

Entry into the Congressional Record for her past work didn't stop Chen from forging new alliances and working towards the vision of equity and inclusion that was on her mind long before others had even considered it. In her continued work to improve the lives of those around her, post-retirement-Nancy-Chen took on new challenges and commitments to public policy; During the COVID pandemic, after several anti-Chinese racial incidents in Naperville, Chen initiated and helped pass, in 2020, a resolution by the Naperville City Council to denounce racism and to support Naperville's Asian American community. In 2022, respecting her long commitment to women in the workforce, Chen founded CAWA (Chinese American Women in Action) an organization whose goals include empowering Chinese American women to lead, create positive change, "to get actively involved in civic and community activities, and to create a real sense of belonging for all of us."

No stranger to hard work, public education, or public service, Chen's personal and professional accomplishments have reinforced and expanded her beliefs surrounding the value of education, individual power, and civic action. The proof is in her long-standing record of accomplishment and her continued drive to not sit idle when lives can still be improved through education, policy, and civic engagement. In 2023 Chen was honored with the Adade Wheeler Woman of the Year Award, an award given to those in District 502 who make significant contributions to the personal and professional advancement of women through education, advocacy, and mentoring. In these endeavors, Chen has proven herself a Woman for the Decades.

Let's get Active! Redesigning Math and Science Classroom for Student Learning

Workshop

40 minutes; interactive, 10mn for questions at the end of the session

This workshop explores strategies for integrating the **thinking classroom framework** into the college STEM classroom. The **thinking classroom framework** is based on decades of published research and popularized in the book <u>Building Thinking Classrooms</u> by Peter LilJedahl. In this workshop, you will develop active learning strategies that promote collaboration among students and truly get students engaged and thinking deeply about the course material. Additionally, you will learn about alternative assessment practices that encourage students to take risks, and develop a growth mindset about their education.

Krista Winters (Carl Sandburg College) and Jake Winters (Black Hawk College) are both STEM educators who love teaching. Krista teaches biology and Jake teaches math. (Fun fact: Both Krista and Jake served as Presidents of the ICCFA).

Round Table: Creating a Comfortable and Safe Classroom for Students

In my opinion, it comes down to the type of environment that the teacher sets up from the very beginning, and then fosters throughout the course of the semester. This interactive session will put everyone in the position of the student walking in on the first day of the semester. The goal is to leave feeling accepted and like you had fun, with the motivation to bring this type of energy into your own classroom.

This Pecha Kucha hits the highlights of an online biology lab sequence designed for nonmajors. It is hands-on and engages students in real and relevant inquiry. I will discuss some of the principles and methods that I use and will share preliminary results based on student work and feedback and will do this in 20 slides for 20 seconds each. The Persistence Project is a faculty-led student success initiative that fosters connections between faculty and students creating a more compassionate campus and serves as a driving force for participating faculty to create stronger interpersonal relationships with their students. Reframing the Narrative: Equity Centered Pedagogy

In this presentation faculty and administration unite to talk about equity-focused activity. The panelists will discuss some of the simple, yet thoughtful, equity-focused changes faculty have made to help address equity in the classroom and how students are responding to the changes. These changes have also impacted faculty, providing a greater awareness and appreciation of the holistic needs of students. Insights into what happens when students feel they matter and are truly seen will also be shared. .

Dr. Joanne Ivory currently serves as the Dean of Career and Technical Programs at Harper College. Using strategic organization development, Dr. Ivory works closely with faculty to create credit and noncredit programs that serve the general and professional communities. This includes collaboration with internal and external partners on internships, apprenticeships, academic and career opportunities that promotes student success.

Nupur Sharma, Professor of Fashion Studies at Harper College. She graduated with a Master of Design degree from the University of Cincinnati. She is an international educator who strives to inspire her students by bringing new opportunities and experiences to them to enhance their resumes, education and employability. In her efforts to expand the classroom beyond the walls, she established a study abroad program in Florence and Paris. 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No More Dev Ed Math: Increasing Access to College Level Math

Recently over 70% of Lake Land College students were placed into developmental math courses. The low success rates of these courses, along with the time and money they required, widened our equity gap for our most at-risk students. In response, Lake Land College has eliminated developmental math courses. By redeveloping our math sequences, using co-requisite models and wrap-around supports, all students are now placed into a college-level math course. We will examine our new math sequences and share our results.

ICCFA Research Grant Recipient Are Bee Genetics All They Are Cracked Up To Bee?

Workshop

40 minutes; interactive, 10mn for questions at the end of the session

One of the main problems facing domestic honeybees is parasitism by the varroa mite (Varro destructor). "... if all bees were to go extinct, we may not be hungry, but we'd likely be pretty sick and miserable," entomologist May Berenbaum noted while explaining, that "bee pollination is very important...for producing most of the crops that provide essential nutrients ... and variety to the human diet. ("What Would Happen if all the bees died?" Georgiou, <u>Aristos Newsweek</u> 13 July 2022. https://www.newsweek.com/what-happen-all-bees-died-agriculture-food-1724114)

In this hands-on workshop, you can help beekeepers monitor for the genetics that help bees detect and resist parasitism caused by varroa mites. Participants will get up close and personal with honeybees and the mites that cause their demise along with learning what we can do individually to help ensure the survival of domestic honeybees.

David Cox: I have been teaching Biology at Lincoln Land Community College for over 25 years. I will often engage my students in a variety of research projects to help them understand the importance of science in their lives. My current research projects involves honeybees.

Constructing and Evaluating the Efficacy of an Interactive Online Mineral Review

In an effort to increase student performance and, curious about how to get students to retain more and understand better the foundations of my discipline, I created a website where Earth Science students can review the physical properties and uses of Earth's minerals. The website hosts my own videos, pictures, and interactive questions because I think knowing the source of the information can help students feel more tied to the material than a textbook targeted to everybody by someone unknown. Fall 2024 students will access this website prior to taking their "Mineral Practical" assessment. I will discuss the project's intent, steps involved in its creation, how the project was delivered, as well as my evaluation of student performance on the "Mineral Practical" assessment after they were exposed to this formative learning tool. The use of Immersive environments and real-world simulations can enhance the learning experience. Both AR (Augmented Reality) and VR (Virtual Reality) are technologies which foster deeper engagement and can provide for personalized learning: Both have the ability to make abstract ideas more tangible and accessible.

This workshop will first survey the disciplines represented in the room to better envision the uses and value of AR/VR across the curriculum. Participants will understand the differences between AR/VR and will theorize on the impact and benefits in education, and in their disciplines today. Seeking a more engaged experience with students in both online and hybrid modes of learning, this pilot project attempts to employ both contract-based grading practices and project-based learning strategies to have undergraduate Sociology students take a more agentic role in their studies. Of particular interest is turning students into active producers of knowledge rather We know often there than simply passive consumers. This presentation showcases the contributions of CE to the Voices of Lake County initiative's "Sustainable Lake County" project (https://www.voicesoflakecounty.com/home). Participants will learn about teaching resources and generate strategies for incorporating CE into their courses.

Student Retention in a Community College Adult Education Program


Adult education programs are often challenged by attrition. I conducted research from Fall 2023 to Summer 2024 on exit reasons for hundreds of students in a community college adult education program. My research has yielded patterns in adult education student attrition through disaggregated data and student surveys. I will share the research, insights, and possibilities to increase student retention in community college adult education programs.

Erin Vobornik has been teaching English as a Second Language (ESL) at Elgin Community College for 11 years. Since the March 2020 whirlwind, she has taught both in-person and fully remote adult education classes. She is passionate about advocacy, student leadership and retention, and equitable learning opportunities.

Keeping Kids (and Everybody Else) Safe in School

Students and Faculty want to feel safe in the classroom. So many factors can distract students from this feeling of safety including threats of an active shooter, severe weather emergencies, as well as fire or medical emergencies. This roundtable will be an opportunity to discuss best practices for creating a classroom environment where students feel safe.
